On October 26, 2020 our Provincial Health Officer issued the following statement: "In light of the increased risks with the respiratory season, the expectation is that people will wear masks in all indoor public spaces. Feast of St. Michael the Archangel

"All heavenly Powers, holy Angels and Archangels, pray to God for us sinners." (Great Compline)

Our Liturgical Year is like a beautiful mosaic made up of the feast of our Lord, the Mother of God, and an immense throng of Martyrs and Saints. The center of this splendid mosaic is our Lord Jesus Christ, as God and as Man. Day and night, His Pilgrim Church on earth and in heaven, the Church in glory, that is - the very great choir of Angels and Saints - everlasting choir of glory; they are the messengers and servants of God. The Angels also fulfill a great role in the redemption of the human race.

Our Holy Church, conscious of the great significance of the Angels for the glory of God and our salvation, has provided a special place for the veneration of the Angels in the mosaic of the Liturgical Year. Here, first place is given to the feast of the Synaxis of St. Michael the Archangel and the rest of the Angelic Powers. To encourage greater devotion to the Angels, it seems appropriate to say a few words here about their cult, the purpose of this feast, and its spiritual significance for us.

The Veneration of the Holy Angels

Before the Lord God created man, He created the holy Angels who are invisible, immortal, perfect beings and pure spirits, possessing a keen intellect and free will. Their number is immeasurably great, as we know from the vision granted to the prophet Daniel who saw the throne of God where "thousands upon thousands were ministering Him, and myriads upon myriads attended Him." (7,10)

In the Book of Revelation St. John the Theologian says; "In my vision I heard the sound of an immense number of Angels gathered round the throne and the living creatures and the elders. They were countless in number, thousands and tens of thousands." (5,11-12) Christ himself in the Gospel speaks of legions of Angels. (Matthew 26, 53)

Ever since the time of Pseudo-Dionysius the Areopagite (5th century), it has been customary to divide the Angels into three orders, each composed of three choirs, giving a total of nine angelic choirs; the Seraphim, Cherubim and Thrones; Dominations, Virtues and Powers; Principalities, Archangels and Angels.

The Lord God, after creating the Angels put them to a test and a great number of the Angels rebelled against Him. St. John the Theologian speaks of a war in heaven (Book of Revelation 12, 7). At the head of the good Angels stood the Archangel Michael who overcame Lucifer and his angels. Hence, in the veneration of the Angels, the holy Church gives first place to St. Michael.
