2 Timothy 3:10-15 Luke 18:10-14 Welcome! The Protection of the Blessed Virgin Mary Parish welcomes all parishioners, guests and friends participating in this Divine Liturgy.

Pray for Ukraine

"I ask you to pray the Our Father for peace in Ukraine, now and throughout this Day. Let us ask the Lord to grant that the country may grow in the spirit of brotherhood, and that all hurts, fears and divisions will be overcome. We have spoken about the Holocaust. But let us think too that [in Ukraine] millions of people were killed [1932-1933]. They are a people who have suffered; they have suffered from hunger, suffered from much brutality and they deserve peace. May the prayers and supplications that today rise up to heaven touch the minds and hearts of world leaders, so that dialogue may prevail and the common good be placed ahead of partisan interests. Please, no more war." Pope Francis, January 26, 2022

The Holy Father's Prayer Intention for February 2022

For religious sisters and consecrated women. We pray for religious sisters and consecrated women; thanking them for their mission and their courage; may they continue to find new responses to the challenges of our times.

World Day of the Sick - February 11, 2022

The Message of Pope Francis for the 30th World Day of the Sick is entitled "Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful (Lk 6:36). Standing beside those who suffer on a path of charity."

"Jesus' invitation to be merciful like the Father - writes the Pope - has particular significance for healthcare workers. I think of all those physicians, nurses, laboratory technicians, the support staff and the caretakers of the sick, as well as the numerous volunteers who donate their precious time to assist those who suffer." People who have made their service a mission. Because Your hands, which touch the suffering flesh of Christ, can be a sign of the merciful hands of the Father."

The Pontiff recalls "the progress that medical science has made, especially in recent times; new technologies have made it possible to prepare therapies that are of great benefit to the sick; research continues to make a valuable contribution to eliminating old and new pathologies; rehabilitation medicine has greatly expanded its expertise and skills. None of this, however, must make us forget the uniqueness of each patient, his or her dignity and frailties." However, He issues a warning and calls for the patient to always be treated as a person with his own dignity. "None of this, however, must make us forget the uniqueness of each patient, his or her dignity and frailties. Patients are always more important than their diseases, and for this reason, no therapeutic approach can prescind from listening to the patient, his or her history, anxieties and fears. Even when healing is not possible, care can always be given. It is always possible to console, it is always possible to make people sense a closeness that is more interested in the person than in his or her pathology."

The Holy Father reaffirms the importance of Catholic healthcare institutions and their commitment to caring for and treating people. "At a time in which the culture of waste is widespread and life is not always acknowledged as worthy of being welcomed and lived, these structures, like "houses of mercy", can be exemplary in protecting and caring for all life, even the most fragile, from its beginning until its natural end."

Finally, He concludes by recalling the indispensable service of the health care ministry, especially in spiritual assistance to the sick, and the commitment that each of us should have in making ourselves close to those who suffer. Because "the ministry of consolation is a task for every baptized person, mindful of the word of Jesus: "I was sick and you visited me" (Mt 25:36)".

Reflection from the Divine Office - Vespers and Matins Sunday of the Publican and Pharisee

Не молімось як фарисей, браття, бо хто підносить себе, буде принижений. Тому смирім себе перед Богом і, постивши, з митарем кличмо: Боже, очисти нас грішних!

Фарисей, гординею переможений, митар же покаянням похилений, приступили до тебе, єдиного Владики. Той, вихваляючись, втратив своє благо, а цей, нічим не хвалившись, дарів сподобився. У таких зітканнях утрерди й мене, Христе Боже, як чоловіколюбець.

Зненавидівши, вірні, велике самохвальство фарисея і наслідуючи покірну молитву митаря, не вихваляймося, але, смиривши себе, в розкаянні закличмо: Боже, очисти гріхи наші!

Слава Отцю, і Сину, і Святому Духові, і нині і повсякчас, і на віки вічні. Амінь.

Господи, ти осудив фарисея, що виправдував себе добрими ділами, а виправдав смиренного митаря, що зітханням благав очищення, бо ти не зважаєш на високодумні помисли, і не погорджуєш скрушеними серцями. Тому і ми в смиренні припадаємо до тебе, що страждав за нас: Дай нам прощення і велику милість.

O faithful, let us not pray as the pharisee, for those who exalt themselves shall be humbled. Let us humble ourselves before God, and with the publican let us say: Lord, have mercy on me a sinner.

The pharisee, overcome with his pride, and the publican, bent down with repentance, came before You, the only Lord. The first trusted in himself and was deprived of Your blessings; the other spoke but a few words and received Your blessings in abundance. Behold my tears and strengthen me, O Christ our God, for You are indeed the Lover of mankind.

O faithful, let us detest the haughty voice of the pharisee; let us imitate the contrite prayer of the publican. Let us not follow the way of the haughty, but falling down, let us say with humility: Spare us, O Lord, because of our many sins.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, now and for ever and ever. Amen.

O Lord, You condemned the pharisee who justified himself by boasting of his good works; and You justified the publican who showed his reserve by seeking forgiveness with his tears. For You do not listen to the speech of the proud, and You do not despise a contrite heart. We prostrate ourselves before You, for You suffered for us in humility. Now grant us forgiveness and great mercy.
