Sacrament of Reconciliation

Confession holds significant importance during Lent, marking a period of spiritual renewal and holiness. Through practices like prayer and kindness, Lent aims for the transformation of negative behaviors. The Sacrament of Reconciliation, or Confession, serves as a powerful starting point for this journey, facilitating reconciliation with God. Confession goes beyond mere cleansing; it awakens the spirit, offering a liberating sense of forgiveness. Sin fractures the promises made during Baptism, leading to separation from God and the Church. However, Confession provides a means for renewed cleansing, acknowledging human frailty and divine forgiveness. While direct appeals to God are essential, confessing to a priest holds significance. Confession involves recognizing and taking responsibility for sins, seeking forgiveness not only from God but also from the community. Priests, as representatives of the Church, guide individuals through this process, addressing the burdens of the soul.

Confession is a communal act, emphasizing the role of the Church in facilitating healing and forgiveness. It discourages mere private confession, highlighting the sacramental nature of the practice within the Church. Regular Confession fosters ongoing repentance, bridging human brokenness with divine forgiveness and emphasizing community healing.

Confession is the sacrament of penance— it takes away our sins. It is God's gift to us. Mortal sin takes away God's grace from the soul. The sacrament of penance restores God's grace to the soul. (Edmonton eparchy)



We all have it. It's called Time. Every morning, it credits you with 86,400 seconds. Every night it writes off, as lost, whatever time you have failed to use wisely. Early History of St Mary's Ukrainian Catholic Parish (part 3)



On September 2 1937 Bishop Ladyka issues an Episcopal decree placing the Parish under the care of the Basilian Fathers. With their arrival the next stage in the growth and development of the parish began. The superiors of the Basilian Order assigned a 28-year-old Fr. Sebastian Shewchuk OSBM to be the first Basilian pastor. He arrived in Vancouver on September 10,1937 and celebrated his first Divine Liturgy at Sacred Heart Church. On October 17,1937 regular services take place at the chapel on Fraser St. The homily is given by the Provincial Superior of the Basilian Order Fr. Naucratius Kryzanowsky OSBM.

Fr Shewchuk began a Ridna Shkola classes for religion and Ukrainian., the St Olga's Society for Women (Frances Babiy president; S. Steshyn Vice president; Kaniuka Secretary; Pearl Babiy, treasurer; A Drushiw and S. Steshyn altar guild. Monsignor Louis Forget transfers the title for the Fraser St property to the Basilian Fathers in May 1939. February 23,1940 Fr. Shewchuk is transferred to Edmonton Ab. He returns as an assistant 1956-1958. Born

August 3,1909 Sheho, SK; ordained August 13,1933; died January 9,1986.



On February 23,1940; 42-year-old Fr. Basil Kamenecky becomes pastor. After a few months due to ill health, he returns to Edmonton on September 5,1940

Born July 13,1898 Vikno Ukraine Ordained July 26,1926 Died May 24,1970



Fr. Theodosius Dobko becomes pastor of St Stephen on September 5,1940. He organizes the first Parish Choir on September 15,1940 and they sing the Divine Liturgy for the first time on January 6,1941 under his direction. Two lots are purchased February 10,1941 on Quebec st and 7th with the intention of building a new church there.

Fr. Dobko assumes the duties of a Chaplain for the Canadian Armed Forces in BC in March 1941. During his absence from Vancouver Fr. George Zydan comes from Vernon to substitute for him. April 1943 Fr. Sylvester Kollar arrives to assist. February 9,1944 the parish purchase a Swedish Lutheran Church (Pender/Princess) for \$10k. The Basilian Fathers move in to their new residence on Princess Ave. The Fraser St and Quebec St properties are sold

May 7,1944 official opening and first Divine Liturgy in the new church which dedicated and named the Protection of the Blessed Virgin Mary (aka St Mary's Ukrainian Catholic Church) Artist Mudrikoff paints the church.

Parishioners Constantine Duda builds a new altar for the church and John Nedilia a new tabernacle.

Fr. Kollar departs July 19,1944 to Edmonton due to poor health. On August 8,1944 Fr. Theodosius Greb arrives as an assistant. September 17,1944 Fr. Dobko resumes full pastoral duties. Father Greb is transferred to the USA and Fr. Christopher Kondratiuk arrives as assistant to the parish. In October 30,1945 Fr. Kondratiuk organizes the Ukrainian Catholic Youth in the parish - Wasyl Popowich, Secretary Gisela Dnistrianska, Treasurer Gloria Kaniuka. Fr.Peter Kotowich arrives in July 1946 in a semi-retirement capacity.
